



The E. W. King House Stained Glass Window



Displayed at the Bristol Public Library

This beautiful stained glass window is original to the foyer of the E.W. King House. The house, built about 1903, is one of the few remaining homes built at the beginning of the 20th Century in Bristol and provides an excellent example of Queen Anne architecture. The BHA plans to restore the property to its original grandeur to serve as a house museum, a repository for artifacts and revolving exhibits relating to important events associated with our city and the East Tennessee and Southwest Virginia regions, and as an educational tool for our schools to use in making local history a fundamental and exciting aspect of students' curriculum. The imperative of teaching Bristol's future generations about their heritage is a key goal of the E.W. King House Project, for by illustrating to our children the importance of understanding their past we encourage and perpetuate pride in our community and its accomplishments. Special thanks to Jud Barry for providing display space for the window until the restorations are

complete.

The site of the home is of further historical significance in that it rests on the site of the 18th Century fort built by Gen. Evan Shelby in 1771 to provide protection for the early settlers of the region from Cherokee Indian raids. It is estimated that nearly 100,000 travelers passed through the fort from 1780 to 1790, including frequent visits from Daniel Boone and George Rogers Clark. It was at Shelby's Fort that the initial plans for the Battle of King's Mountain were conceived resulting in a victory which

turned the tide of the Revolutionary War.

The I.C. Fowler House by Bud Philips



Isaac Chapman Fowler was born at Jeffersonville, VA, September 23, 1831, the son of Dr. Thomas Fowler and wife Priscilla. He was educated at Emory and Henry College. Later he was connected to the Commissary Department of the Confederate States of America during the Civil War. Soon after the War, he came to Bristol where he became editor of the Bristol News. He bought lots fronting Spencer Street and had his home built there in 1868. The house was built by George Blackley, a master carpenter. The house was fashioned in the Greek Revival style which was rather rare for this area at the time.

I.C. Fowler began his political career by serving as mayor of Goodson, VA. He then served in the Virginia House of Delegates from 1875-79 and again in 1881-83. During his latter term he served as Speaker of the House. In 1884 he was appointed Clerk of the US District Court in Abingdon and served until 1904. I.C. Fowler died April 29, 1905, and is buried near the junction of Bud Phillips Drive and Julian Burroughs Circle in Bristol's historic East Hill Cemetery.

The Fowler house has a second claim to fame. After the Fowlers moved to Abingdon, the house became home to Charles E. Finch and family. Mr. Finch was the son in law of L. F. Johnson, a pioneer Bristol settler and prominent businessman. Finch was a member of the Goodson City Council, and it was on his motion that Goodson was renamed Bristol. Mr. Finch was the local agent for the N & W Railroad and as such he had been troubled by the fact that local passenger and freight depots all gave their location as "Bristol" while the town was called "Goodson". Doubtless it was of great relief to him to see the matter settled.

After Finch there were several owners, but by the late 1980s the house was vacant and would have soon been demolished but for Mr. Sid Oakley's generously donating the house to the BHA to be protected and restored. I am happy to report that it is now in the hands of one, Scott Otis, who we believe will do a true restoration so that the house will be preserved for generations to come.









Bristol's Confederate Soldier Statue By Joyce Kistner

The Italian marble statue of a Confederate soldier located at the Bristol Depot is now being readied for a change in location. Because of acid rain, twenty-five rumbling trains passing daily, six intersecting lanes of traffic, and no manner of cleaning its surface for eighty-eight years, the statue needs a safer and more appropriate place to reside. Two possible sites under consideration are the War Memorial Park and East Hill Cemetery.

The Ann Carter Lee United Daughters of the Confederacy and Sons of Confederate Veterans are working on a plan of preservation of the statue. Many groups are willing to help, but much more ground work needs to be laid.



Teaching Bristol's History In The Public Schools By Carolyn Williams

Bristol Historical Association, under the capable writing, planning and direction of Joyce Kistner, initiated a program last school year of teaching the history of Bristol Virginia-Tennessee in the elementary schools on both sides of town. Two separate programs, one about early settlers and another about trains, are being combined into one lesson this year. Joyce will present the curriculum to fourth grade classes in nine city

schools and to one in Washington County, Virginia.

Students are encouraged to read their lesson together on CD. A new upgrade will be added next year in book form. Students will continue to "dress up" in clothing portraying Bristol characters of the past.
