A Historic Open House

The Bristol Historical Association's E.W. King House Committee held an Open House at the E. W. King House and Grounds on Saturday, September 15th in conjunction with the Rhythm and Roots Reunion Festival. This event featured live performances by two Bluegrass bands-- the Green Bean String Band from Asheville, NC and the Tennessee High School Bluegrass Band "Slim Pickens". The festivities also included an Antiques and Collectibles Sale and an Exhibit of Historic Artifacts of local and regional significance, including furniture, documents, and musical instruments, inside the house. Special exhibit items were generously placed on loan for the day by Bristol historians Tim Buchanan and V.N. "Bud" Phillips. In addition, Mr. Phillips brought a varied selection of his books detailing aspects of Bristol's history and remained present for book sales and signings throughout the day.

Volunteers from the BHA and community at large combined with Committee members resulted in a total of 25 people staffing the Open House. Guest registry signatures numbered over 220, with actual attendance estimated at over 250. This event provided a wonderful opportunity to begin realizing one of the ultimate goals for this property, educating the community about local history, despite the house's currently unrestored state. Visitors who toured the house and exhibits came away enlightened of the multifaceted role it will ultimately play in the future as an integral part of Bristol's rich historic fabric and culture.




State Marker to be Placed Where Bristol Began by Bud Phillips

I have good news for all who love Bristol history. What many of us call the most historic spot in Bristol is soon to be marked. This state marker will be placed near the southwest corner of State Street and Martin Luther King Boulevard.

In 1852, Joseph Rhea Anderson contracted for one hundred acres of the best part of his father-in-law's plantation. (This father-in-law was Rev. James King.) At that time the Virginia portion of Anderson's purchase contained the beautiful King's meadows where grazed King's prize herd of shorthorn Herford cattle. The Tennessee portion was largely planted in grain crops. The survey of the planned Town of Bristol began on Monday, August 2, 1852, at a point near where this state marker will be placed. A copy of the map of the Town of Bristol, made from this survey, showing the territory covered by it, may be viewed in the office of the Circuit Court Clerk, Bristol, Virginia. It is slide number 1.

At first, Anderson chose a site for his home on the Virginia side of the town. This site was located directly across the street from where a spring then flowed from under the little hill where now stands the Bristol depot. However, he finally chose the lot upon which this marker is soon to be placed. The combined home and business house that he had erected there in 1853, was the first building erected within the boundaries of the original Town of Bristol. The new town developed around this point.

Many firsts occurred in this new building. The Bristol Post Office was opened there on November 5, 1853. The Anderson store, the first in Bristol, opened for business on Christmas Eve, 1853. The first article sold in that store yet exists and is kept here at Pleasant Hill. The first church service in Bristol was held there on Christmas day, 1853. The first Sunday School was organized there in early 1854. Private banking began there later that year. And Isaac Anderson, son of Joseph R. Anderson was born there in 1854 and was the first child born in Bristol. There are several other firsts that happened in this building. For a list of them see my book "Between the States."

This house was occupied by the Anderson family until 1881, when they moved to their new home at 516 Anderson Street. This newer house was serving the local YWCA when I came to Bristol in 1953.

The historic old Anderson home was demolished about 1930. I have been told that some of the brick from it later became part of the replica of the slave quarters now standing behind the Deery Inn at Blountville.

Several years ago I came to the conclusion that the beginning point of Bristol should be marked. Now I am happy to tell you that it will be done!



The Robert Preston Home

A Draft Environmental Assessment has been received which outlines the city's proposal to develop a new business complex, "The Sugar Hollow Business Complex" which could incorporate the current location of the Preston House at Sugar Hollow.



The proposal includes conditions requiring the city to establish a visual buffer on the west and north sides of a 2 acre donated parcel to screen the house from the business complex. This area would allow the incorporation of the existing log building behind the house as well as a garden and orchard. The road access to this property has been approved by TVA.

In the event the house would have to be relocated, a proposal was made in October of 2006 to the Walnut Grove Presbyterian Church membership to relocate the Preston House onto their church property. The church voted to accept the house under conditions that were acceptable and agreed upon by BHA and the church.

If the log building must be moved, Emmit Yeary of Fairview Abingdon Foundation has indicated that they would be interested in it and would place a plaque on the building explaining its history.

Expenses are being calculated for the lowering of Embarq's telephone lines and other electrical lines for a potential move.

An engineer from Embarq was sent to revisit the project, and the conclusion was made that if the house were to be moved and exit the property at another location, the cost would be \$3,000 instead of \$10,000.00.

Recent acquisitions for the house include a copy of Dr. Edward Foley's book "The Preston Family of Walnut Grove" and a copy of a book of the Holston Valley by Mr. Tom Preston.
