Robert Preston House

The Robert Preston House At Walnut Grove brochure has been printed and is being sent in the coming weeks to prospective contributors. You may read more about this project by going to our website www.BristolHistoricalAssociation.com About ten years ago, BHA began efforts to save and restore this historic and architecturally important house as a living history site for students and a destination for tourists and groups interested in the history of this area. Two years ago, following consultations with Alpha Natural Resources management, an agreement was reached with the owners of the Preston site to sell the land to BHA, a move which eliminated the possibility of having to relocate the house. A list of all the accomplishments achieved over the last ten years as well as a description of the house's historical significance can be found in this informative new brochure now available for download from our web site. The Tobacco Commission recently awarded \$75,000.00 for restoration of the house.



near our famed Exit 7, is one of the oldest in this area.

It is likely a few years beyond its second century mark. This was once the manor house on what was one of the largest plant-

ations ever to exist in the vicinity of Bristol. Much has been written about it so I will try not to be repetitious.

The basic plan of the main house is the common two over two arrangement with dividing hall on both floors. But there is a little difference here; the hall is not in the center, thus two rooms are smaller than the others.

A very old picture (pre-1900) shows that there was a narrow, two-story portico at the front of the house. About 1910, this was removed and a onestory porch was added that extended along the entire length of the house. Originally, there was no in-house kitchen.

During the period in which the original house was built, and for many years thereafter, it was common for such houses to have detached, or as they were commonly called, yard kitchens. This kept the main house cooler in summer, and also helped with any kitchen odors that might develop. Too, it was hoped that if the main house should burn, the kitchen might be left to use as a shelter until another house could be built. It is very likely that the log house that still stands in the back yard was the



outside kitchen for Walnut Grove.

A careful inspection of this old log structure clearly shows that it was not built for a smoke house or other utility building. Instead, it appears to have been built as a dwelling house. This leads me and several other researchers to think that this may have been the original Preston home. This would mean that it is several years older than the large frame house near it. I further think that when the big frame house was built, the much smaller log house became the yard kitchen.

Over the years a myth developed that the big house was constructed of logs and was later covered over with lumber. It appears that confusion with the older house was the source of this myth.

About 1900, a full-length lean-to section was added to the back of the frame house. This housed a

kitchen and dining room. Later-a bathroom was built in the dining room area of the addition.

The grove of giant walnut trees that once surrounded the home yard has long been gone, but remaining here are two of the oldest structures in Washington County, Va. Certainly they are worthy of careful restoration and preservation.
